The restroom areas on the arrivals level of the new terminal have noticeable face lifts now, as multiple forms of tile, crafted by local artisans, have been installed.

Thus far, work by Don Cella of Limelight Tile can be seen on the walls and behind mirrors of the restrooms, while Brian Peters' Building Bytes supplied 3D printed tiling that will be seen above the baby-changing stations.

Other work from local artisans will include forged aluminum coat hooks and vases by Brian Gehner of Transit Forge, as well as repurposed wood from the region for Flight Information Display screens created by Urban Tree and founder Jason Boone.

The installations of these artisans' work will continue over the next several months as the new Pittsburgh International Airport rounds into shape aesthetically and functionally.
